Remote education provision: information for parents

This information is intended to provide clarity and transparency to pupils and parents or carers about what to expect from remote education where national or local restrictions require entire cohorts (or bubbles) to remain at home.

The remote curriculum: what is taught to pupils at home

A pupil's first day or two of being educated remotely might look different from our standard approach, while we take all necessary actions to prepare for a longer period of remote teaching. In the event of a full lockdown, the following will be put into place immediately.

Following the first few days of remote education, will my child be taught broadly the same curriculum as they would if they were in school?

We will teach the same curriculum remotely as we do in school wherever possible and appropriate. However, we will need to make some adaptations in some subjects. For example, PE will be suggested activities for children to complete at home independently along with some links to online fitness ideas.

Children will have daily English and Maths lessons, along with suggested spelling, grammar or handwriting activities and times tables / number facts activities. Younger children will have daily phonics sessions provided. Children are expected to read daily.

Children will have a daily wider curriculum lesson. This will be based on the curriculum each class would normally be learning in school.

Some subjects are 'on hold' during remote learning and we plan to catch these up when children return to school. These subjects are French, music and computing (although on-line safety will continue to be taught).

We also plan to deliver 'themed' weeks as appropriate - for example, Wellbeing

Week (w/b 1st February) will be an opportunity to engage in wellbeing activities to encourage time away from a screen. Other themed weeks may incorporate elements of scientific discovery or historical knowledge. During these weeks, core subjects of maths and reading will continue.

Remote teaching and study time each day

How long can I expect work set by the school to take my child each day?

We expect that remote education (including remote teaching and independent work) will take pupils broadly the following number of hours each day:

Early Years	On average over a week these children will be provided with 3 hours remote learning daily.
Key Stage 1	On average over a week these children will be provided with 4 hours remote learning daily.
Key Stage 2	On average over a week these children will be provided with 4 hours remote learning daily.

Accessing remote education

How will my child access any online remote education you are providing?

We will use Google Classroom to set daily learning. Children/parents each have a user account through the school RM Unify network provider. The daily learning is scheduled to go live at 8am each day (Mon-Fri). Live lessons and sessions are scheduled using Google Meet - links will be sent each day. We have scheduled daily live lessons throughout the morning so siblings are able to access equipment at home.

Work is 'turned in' by pupils. A comment can be added and work can be uploaded. Teachers provide comments on learning completed. Reception class also make use of the Tapestry app - teachers, teaching assistants and parents make use of this to monitor progress against Early Learning Goals. <https://tapestryjournal.com/>

Each class teacher also makes use of Twitter as appropriate, to communicate with families. The school also has a school YouTube channel in which announcements and assemblies are broadcast.

Parents do not need to download any new apps to access live sessions.

From time to time children will also be sent pre-recorded lessons/storytimes.

Please remember, if at any point a parent or child is concerned about something they have viewed online they should report it immediately to the school and if appropriate to [CEOP](#).

If my child does not have digital or online access at home, how will you support them to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils may not have suitable online access at home. We take the following approaches to support those pupils to access remote education:

In anticipation that not all children are able to access reliable broadband, or indeed may not have access to a device, we have sent home maths workbooks for all children (White Rose) together with an A4 writing book. Teachers will ensure that no work is set that requires any resources to be printed. Children are asked to complete their work in these homework books and are invited to upload photos of this to their work space on Google Classroom if possible. Teachers then provide feedback on the work..

If your child is struggling to access online learning due to a digital access difficulty then please contact the school office (office@weltonprimaryschool.co.uk) so we are aware of the nature of the difficulty and can do all that we can to support and help. The help we are able to offer will depend on the nature of difficulties and resources available to us at the time.

- We may be able to lend your child a school chromebook.
- We may be able to give you access to an unlimited-data SIM.
- We may be able to apply for increased mobile data or 4G routers.

How will my child be taught remotely?

We use a combination of the following approaches to teach pupils remotely:

- live teaching (online lessons, including story times and small group/1:1 catch up teaching sessions)
- White Rose maths workbooks
- recorded teaching (e.g. Oak National Academy lessons, video/audio recordings made by teachers)
- textbooks and reading books pupils have at home
- commercially available websites supporting the teaching of specific subjects or areas, including video clips or sequences
- Online reading schemes and libraries
- Instructional daily slides with activities and tasks provided and explained

Engagement and feedback

What are your expectations for my child's engagement and the support that we as parents and carers should provide at home?

We expect all children to login each day.

The Google Classroom 'classwork' section explains what learning should be completed. The 'stream' will contain teacher comments and links to the live Google Meet sessions. Not all work completed by children will need to be uploaded.

We endeavour to make the daily learning as accessible as possible for children to access with minimal support or instruction from parents at home. This is because we recognise the challenges for parents with more than one child at home and / or are working from home. The inclusions of written, recorded or live instructions support children to be as independent as possible.

We expect parents to encourage their children to do their best.

We ask parents to support children to establish a daily routine that fits around everyone in the household and to help as necessary with setting up digital devices for the day. Some children may need parental support each day or to log onto live lessons however if this is not possible then the school has arranged for staff to be on technical support each day - 01761 413131.

Please support your children to join in live sessions as they are an opportunity for the teacher to 'touch base' with your child and also to support with instant

feedback on learning difficulties.

We expect parents to contact us if they or their child are struggling so that we can offer support and guidance. When children are struggling, class teachers may suggest key learning to prioritise such as phonics and reading.

Older children can use Google Classroom to message a teacher if they are finding an aspect of the learning challenging. Teachers are available throughout most of every day to respond with help. We have also arranged for teaching and support staff to be available in the afternoons for bespoke 1:1/small group interventions.

How will you check whether my child is engaging with their work and how will I be informed if there are concerns?

Teachers will keep a daily and weekly register showing who is engaging and to what extent.

In the first instance of a concern over engagement, the class teacher will contact the parent via with a phone call. If the child continues to struggle to engage the head teacher will make contact to discuss concerns and further ways school could support the child/family.

There will be a weekly whole school celebration assembly (usually Fridays at 2.30pm). These will be live on YouTube and will be an opportunity for the whole school community to share in the good work that has been completed during the week. This will also be an opportunity for the teachers to offer whole class feedback and encouragement for better engagement or effort as required.

How will you assess my child's work and progress?

Feedback can take many forms and may not always mean extensive written comments for individual children. For example, whole-class feedback or quizzes marked automatically via digital platforms are also valid and effective methods, amongst many others. Our approach to feeding back on pupil work is as follows:

- Written feedback on set pieces of work throughout the week, sent as comments on Google Classroom
- Quizzes (e.g. Google Forms) and summary sessions
- Teachers will track general achievement based on the work which is uploaded to portfolios. The nature of this will depend on the subject and task. Eg. spelling test scores. It is not possible for a teacher to be certain the extent to which a child needed support from a parent and so the information is a guide only to inform planning when the class return to

school

Additional support for pupils with particular needs

How will you work with me to help my child who needs additional support from adults at home to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils, for example some pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), may not be able to access remote education without support from adults at home. We acknowledge the difficulties this may place on families, and we will work with parents and carers to support those pupils in the following ways:

- Parents of pupils with SEN will be contacted by the SENCO to plan how we will support their child.
- Children with an Educational Health Care Plan will be invited into school as they will be classed as 'vulnerable' pupils.
- Work on the daily slides will be differentiated to include opportunities for all pupils. Pupils will be directed to the correct level activity to access.
- Some pupils may have a different live/prerecorded lesson planned and delivered by teachers and teaching assistants.
- Where pupils are attending school, interventions will be delivered within school as far as is possible with available staffing. These will include precision teaching, speech and language and 1:1 reading.
- Some children with recognised needs will be supported online through 1:1/small group sessions (e.g. speech and language) each week.
- Where children receive support from an outside agency, the school will arrange for this support to continue either in school or remotely.
- For younger pupils who may need support from parents, we will ensure the daily work is clear and that the staff are available for questions. Activities will have an element of choice for parents, each choice having a varied level of support required.

Remote education for self-isolating pupils

Where individual pupils need to self-isolate but the majority of their peer group remains in school, how remote education is provided will likely differ from the approach for whole groups. This is due to the challenges of teaching pupils both at home and in school.

If my child is not in school because they are self-isolating, how will their remote education differ from the approaches described above?

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The class teacher and headteacher will make regular contact with you to help clarify the situation and how we can best provide education for your child through these circumstances.

Generally, the class teacher will send a daily set of learning based on the previous day's learning in class. This will allow the child who is shielding to keep pace with the whole class but without increasing teaching workload.

The Educational Welfare Officer may also contact the family to offer their services and support.

If the child at home is struggling or they are not engaging, we will provide support in the same way as outlined above.
